MONTHLY ALLOWABLES

- Drainable Pouches: 20 per month
- Urinary Pouches: 20 per month
- Closed pouches: 60 per month
- Irrigation sleeves: 4 per month
- Solid skin barriers and skin barriers with flange: 20 per month
- Ostomy belts: 1 per month

You are entitled to obtain 1, 2, or 3 months supply at a time if you live at home and 1 months supply if you are in a nursing home.

It is necessary to have a doctor's order or prescription in order to submit supplies to insurance.

If you need more supplies other than those allowed, you will simply be required to obtain a letter from your doctor explaining the medical reason for needing more supplies than the usual maximum quantities as listed above. Your supplier does not need to routinely submit this letter with your claim, but must keep it on file in your records as a copy may be requested.

Friends of Ostomates Worldwide (FOW) accepts donations of new, unused pouches, flanges (face plates), skin barriers, skin wipes, past, tapes, belts, pouch deodorant, pouch covers, scissors, wrapped soap (small hotel soaps are good), and pediatric supplies. FOW cannot ship flammables, liquids, aerosols, or used equipment. When donating, FOW asks that you include the donor’s name on both the inside and outside of the carton. I'M ALIVE...YOU'RE ALIVE...WE BOTH HAVE OSTOMIES

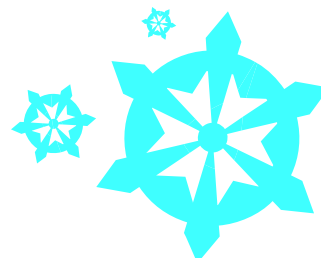

We can tell people that an ostomy is not the end of a normal life. Sometimes they may have a loved one who must face this surgery. We can hop that because we were "normal, happy, well-adjusted and alive", and told someone about our ostomy, their loved one would fare better, perhaps, than we did. Try it...wouldn't it make you feel good to think someone could benefit from your experience?

KEEP A MEDICAL JOURNAL

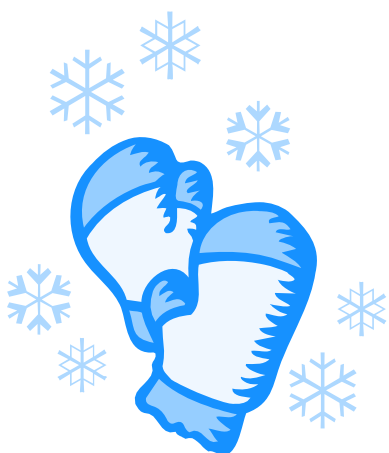
Often a problem has been nagging at your body for weeks or months. Sometimes a piece of equipment doesn't work properly. When you finally break down and go to the doctor, or consult and ET nurse, you find that they ask questions about the history of the problem that you can't answer. As a result, their diagnosis is not based on complete information. To avoid a faulty or inadequate diagnosis, it is wise to write down the symptoms of the problems as they occur. Often, you will find that by writing down these symptoms and the events which precede them, you, yourself, can spot some obvious solution (or at least, causes). A medical journal can help you to avoid false assumptions about your problems; it can also aid you when similar problems crop up in the future. Accurate information is always welcomed by your doctor or ET.



WHAT WOULD YOU DO IF?

Trust me, every ostomate has had or will have an “ostomy accident.” By accident, I mean a pouch leak of some kind. The question is, “are you prepared in case an accident occurs away from home?” Not so much prepared as far as having a change of clothes and extra pouches, but prepared emotionally to deal with the unexpected mishap. The reality of it is that every ostomate must think of he or she would do if at a party, in a restaurant, work or anywhere else, your pouch leaked because it wasn’t on securely, or the clasp came off and the contents were spilling out. The question is, “What do you do if you feel your pouch is not on securely or you feel wet around your pouch? First of all, you think that everyone is noticing you and knows what’s happening. Stay calm. Go to the nearest bathroom and take care of business. Most likely, your friends are continuing their conversation in the restaurant or in your workplace and no one knows you are temporarily missing. When I encountered an accident while I was in a group situation, I just removed myself and took my time in freshening up and rejoined my friends. No explanation is ever necessary! The more outings you take and the more public situations you are in, the more confident you will be as time goes on.
